Saúl Jiménez-Sandoval serves as Dean of the College of Arts and Humanities at Fresno State. He is deeply committed to Fresno State's mission to educate and empower the multicultural students who will become tomorrow's leaders. As Dean, Dr. Jiménez-Sandoval has worked toward elevating 4-year graduation rates by deploying multiple initiatives: an informational College Student Convocation each Fall, increased faculty engagement, and direct collaboration between the college Advising and Support Center and Student Affairs.

As he has experienced first-hand the transformative power of learning, he envisions an integrated society nurtured by the quest for self-empowerment through education.
